Or fear can be imagined and unwarranted - we fear the unknown, new places we have to visit, new situations in our lives, new people we have to meet, or we fear change from the comfort we're used to.

So fear, by itself, being natural, is not a sin. But how we react and deal with it can be.

Too much unwarranted fear could be an insult to God in that we do not trust Him enough to look after us and care for us. Prayers are the answer.

Consider carefully what it is that causes your fear and if there is a genuine reason then seek help. Discuss the matter with a trusted relative or friend. If there is cause for concern then do not suffer and worry alone. Get help and let someone else see your problem from their perspective.

If however your anxiety is without foundation; and there is nothing practicable you can do to change the situation; trust in God. Tell Him how you feel and seek His help to calm you down. He has conquered fear. He has conquered the future. As well as evil. Forever.

Do not be a fraid – I will save you. I have called you by name – you are mine. Isaiah 43:1

BLESSINGS

Overheard on a bus: "... you must count your blessings!" I thought about that for a moment or two and then I started counting silently. Pretty soon I ran out of fingers to count on, and had to start again.

It's quite a salutary lesson you know. Counting how blessed we are.

Try it sometime.

THE WISE RABBI

Once upon a time there was a Rabbi who noticed with concern that his congregation was always worrying about something or other.

"Oh dear ..." said one member, "business is bad and I don't know how I'll survive this economic crisis". "I agree" said another, "I have to go away on a trip and none of my children wants to mind the shop for me. I'll have to close it and lose business". "My problem is worse ..." said another. And so it went on week in week out.

One Sabbath the Rabbi decided to do something about it; so when it came to giving a sermon he acknowledged that we all have problems of one kind or another. He suggested that by the following Sabbath everyone should bring with them to the synagogue a stone or a rock to which they should tie securely a label. On the label they should describe briefly the nature of their problem – anonymously of course. The stone or rock should be the size commensurate to the size or magnitude of the problem.

The following Sabbath, sure enough, they all brought their rocks which they left outside the synagogue. There were small rocks, bigger ones, stones of all shapes and sizes and even a few pebbles tied inside a handkerchief to denote a lot of small problems. One or two funny men even brought big boulders in wheelbarrows to show how huge their problems were.

During the sermon the Rabbi said that he had read all the labels tied to the rocks and stones. He said that he had prayed about the peoples' problems and that God had spoken to him. God promised that if everyone goes out and picks up a rock from the pile outside then their own problems would immediately vanish away. But instead they will take on the problem written on the label tied to the rock they've picked up.

So the Rabbi asked them to go out, read the labels, and choose a rock to take home with them.

They all went out, and after reading all the labels, each one of them picked the same rock or stone they had brought with them to the synagogue that morning.

And the moral of the story is: no matter your situation, there is always someone much worse than you.



OUR ROAD TO EMMAUS

Just after Christ's Resurrection, two of His followers were going to Emmaus. (Luke 24:13-35). They were totally distraught about Jesus' death, and even though there was now news that His tomb is empty and that Christ is alive, they were still down-hearted and confused.

Jesus appeared to them on the way. They did not recognize Him. They spoke with Him and told Him their news. They said that their Lord and leader had been crucified, and there were rumors going around that He was alive again.

Jesus did not tell them who He was but explained to them the prophets' predictions about Him. He walked with them all the way to Emmaus, but still they did not recognize Him. It wasn't until He broke and blessed the bread that they recognized Him.

Why? I ask myself. Why did they not recognize Him when they first saw Him, or when He took the time to explain to them the writings of the prophets? Could it be that their minds were more pre-occupied with their problems and their dilemma rather than listening to Him?

You can just imagine how their mind worked and how concerned they were about their predicament. Their leader is dead. What are they to do now? Is it all over? Every thing He said and taught comes to nothing? And what of the future? What are His followers to do now?

But aren't we just the same.

How often do events touch our lives and turn it upside down. Events perhaps of our making, or events that we did not contribute to but they affect us all the same.

And we panic. What are we to do now? What will happen next? We fear the future, we fear matters getting out of our control and we turn our attention to our problems and our dilemma. Just like those two on the way to Emmaus.

Yet, all the time we are panicking Jesus is there. Walking beside us. Quite literally. Waiting for us to recognize Him and hold His hand in the full knowledge and trust that He will see us through our darkest hour.



TWISTING THE WORD

Once upon a time Jesus was in a synagogue on the Sabbath; and there was a man with a paralyzed hand. (Matthew 12: 9–14).

Some people wanted to accuse Jesus of doing wrong and asked Him whether it is against their Law to heal (work) on the Sabbath.

Jesus asked them if any of them had a sheep which fell into a deep hole on the Sabbath whether they would rescue it. Then to prove His point, He healed the man with the paralyzed hand.

So what is Jesus saying here? Is He encouraging people to break one of the Ten Commandments?

Of course not.

Jesus is saying: Beware of those who would use God's Word for their own ends. They would either take it literally or miss-quote it to suit their own argument and to their benefit.

God has given you a brain. Use it.

It is there to help you discern what is right and what is wrong. The Commandments are there to guide you through life. Not to be used by you and interpreted in such a way so that you can twist their meaning for your own selfish needs.

MOANER LISA

I asked a sick old man how he was doing, just as a conversation starter. He replied: I can't complain ... there are so many others worse than me.

This set me thinking. When we complain about our situation, it may be a big thing, or a small matter ... a little grumble ... you know what I mean. What are we doing exactly? We are opening the door one tiny little bit for the devil to sneak in and play havoc with our thoughts. One tiny complaint leads to another ... and soon we become a Moaner Lisa!!!

If our Walk with Christ is to be perfect we should trust Him in everything. And stop moaning!



RESPONSIBLE WEALTH

While Jesus was eating, a woman came in with an alabaster jar full of very expensive perfume made from pure nard. She broke the jar and poured the perfume on Jesus' head. Some of the people there became angry and said to one another, "What was the use of wasting the perfume? It could have been sold for more than three hundred silver coins and the money given to the poor!" And they criticized her harshly.

But Jesus said, "Leave her alone! Why are you bothering her? She has done a fine and beautiful thing for me. You will always have poor people with you, and any time you want to, you can help them. But you will not always have me." Mark 14 3-7.

It is perhaps significant that no one asked Jesus, "Why? Why will we always have the poor with us?"

Is Jesus saying that God will always allow poverty in this world? Is He saying that all our efforts to help the poor are in vain?

Of course not. He is not saying this.

Jesus is reminding us that there will always be someone worse off than us. Someone who is poor in material things, poor in spirit, poor in health, poor in education or poor in Faith.

He is reminding us of our responsibility towards those in poverty in one way or another.

If we are fortunate to be rich, we should give to those who have not. If we are in good health, we should help those who are sick. And if our Faith is strong, we should help and pray for those who falter and fail in their walk with the Lord.

This is our responsibility to those who are poor in one way or another.

And with this responsibility comes a greater and more onerous one. That is to answer to Him when He asks us: "And what have you done with the riches I gave you?"

PERCENTAGE BELIEF

A man named Jarius pleaded with Jesus for help because his daughter was dying. (Luke 8:40-56). On His way to Jarius' house, with a crowd following, there was a woman who had been ill for some time and doctors could do nothing for her. She thought: "if only I could get close enough to Jesus and touch His cloak, I'll be healed." And so she did, and she was healed. Jesus felt her touching Him and said to her: "Your Faith has healed you."

As He continued His journey a messenger came and told Jarius that his daughter was dead. "Don't disturb Jesus any further."

Jesus said to Jarius: "Don't be afraid; only believe and she will be well." He then went to the house and raised the child from the dead.

As He was leaving that place, two blind men followed Jesus. (Matthew 9:27-31). They begged Him to be healed. So Jesus asked them: "Do you believe that I can heal you?" "Yes" they answered. Jesus touched their eyes and said: "Let it happen, then, just as you believe!" And their sight was restored.

The common theme in these three incidents is that the individuals concerned believed in Jesus and in His power of healing.

The woman did not even have to ask Him. She believed that touching Him alone would heal her. Jarius must have been devastated to hear of his daughter's death; but Jesus told him to believe. He had a quick choice to make: carry on towards the house with Jesus, or send Him away. He believed in Jesus. The two blind men were asked directly: "Do you believe that I can heal you?"

What a challenge from Jesus Himself. Do you really believe? Or are you here because you may have heard so much about me, or as a gamble that it might work, or for some other reason?

When we earnestly pray to God and ask for something; what percentage in us really believes that He can help us? Or is there that minute 1% of a doubt lurking there, at the back of our mind, making us doubt His willingness, or ability, to help?



FOCUS ON GOD'S WILL

Crises will happen to us from time to time. God permits them for His own purpose and for His own reasons.

Our natural reaction may be to panic.

Our un-natural reaction is to remain calm. Take a deep breath and trust in God. At times of crisis we need to proceed slowly, in the conscious knowledge that God is with us and will protect us.

I repeat: in the conscious knowledge.

We should speak our truth quietly, as the opportunity arises, and as the Holy Spirit guides us. We should avoid needless talk, or needless worries and concerns. But nurture a peace in our hearts that comes from Him, who cares and will protect us. If we allow Him to.

Our prayers should be focused on His will, and His plans for us in this critical situation; in the sure belief that He will see us through it just as He has brought us to it.

CHRIST'S PRAYER FOR US

Just before He was arrested, Jesus prayed for His disciples. (John 17).

Then He prayed for us – yes, you and me. He said:

"I pray not only for them, (the disciples), but also for those who believe in me because of their message. I pray that they may all be one. Father! May they be in us, just as you are in me and I am in you. May they be one, so that the world will believe that you sent me." John 17: 20-21.

Two thousand years later Christians are still disagreeing with each other.

The more we dispute on minor things the more we throw doubts and confusion on the Christian message to this world.

GOD WITH US

Intelligence and knowledge increases from one generation to the next. What you and I know, our parents didn't. And what our parents knew, their parents and grandparents didn't. The same applies to relationships and the nature of relationships, I suppose.

Some people today have a personal relationship with God and His Son Jesus. They are not just characters in a book, or in the Bible. They are living Beings with whom we communicate and who communicate with us, help us, guide us, and protect us throughout our lives in preparation for the next. These are no glib words; but a true reality for some people today.

Others, however, believe in God alright, but He is a little distant. Sitting somewhere up there in the clouds, on His throne, looking at us, and ready to help us when we ask Him. They go to church alright, but to them at least, their relationship with their maker is not a close one. Full of reverence, of course, and perhaps tinged with a modicum of fear.

Our grandparents' sermons were full of God's wrath, fire and brimstone, and the dread of eternal damnation in hell. But today, a sermon like that would not go down too well – would it? It would probably not be taken too seriously by church attendants, never mind those who don't go to church.

So how do we communicate God, Jesus, Heaven and hell in today's sophisticated modern world full of cynicism, bitterness and bile?

Some describe hell as being in the complete absence of God for eternity. But then, there are those in this state right now, in this very lifetime; so how can they see or understand the concept of hell, never mind fear it?

Perhaps one way is to accentuate the positive in a personal and close relationship with God. Not then ... in Heaven ... sometime in the future. But here and now, today, and every day.

Through the Holy Spirit. Not much is said about the Holy Spirit in church these days. Yet He is here, living, loving, and ready to guide us in this life, in preparation for an eternity with God, in the next. If we let Him. And these are no glib words ... but meant, quite literally.



THE HOLY SPIRIT

After Jesus was raised to Heaven, the Holy Spirit came upon the disciples in shapes of flames which touched each person there. They were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to preach in many languages. (Acts 2).

So, who is the Holy Spirit?

We are taught about God the Father, Jesus the Son, and the Holy Spirit He doesn't seem to have a title or description.

St Hilary of Poitiers, a Bishop in the 3rd Century AD, described the Holy Spirit as "the gift".

He is the gift given to us by God after Jesus ascended into Heaven. He is the very Spirit of God, God Himself, come back to us on earth to dwell within us and to help us in our Christian life.

That's why He is sometimes referred to as the Helper, the Counselor, God's own Being living within us.

Can you imagine that? God. Living within us. Guiding us. Helping us. Teaching us. Advising us when to speak and when to remain silent. What to say and what to do.

Isn't that wonderful? Or is it too difficult to imagine or believe?

Isn't it a tragedy that in this day and age, many are too willing to believe that the devil can possess an individual unwillingly and reap havoc in their lives; yet ... they find it difficult to understand that the Spirit of God is willing to abide within us and lead us to an eternal better life in Heaven.

But only if we ask Him to.

Thank you Lord for your Holy Spirit. May we grow to understand Him better and welcome Him into our lives.

THE HUMANITY OF CHRIST

When Jesus came to earth He came as a human to share humanity with us so that we can accept Him and learn from Him. He was born a human baby, grew up a human and shared every emotion we share as human beings.

Imagine for a minute if He came like a God (which He was/is). Imagine if He suddenly appeared like a superman or such other fictional hero. With obvious powers like flying, super strength, X Ray visions, and so on like we see in the movies. The people of the time would have been in total awe of Him and would have obeyed and followed Him out of fear or wonderment. Hardly free choice – is it?

So He came as a human. He humbled Himself as a baby born in poverty in a stable. Grew up with the poor and the down and outs - not as a king. As a human He felt every emotion that we feel. He felt sadness at the death of Lazarus, He felt pity for the ill and the poor, He felt pain when beaten and Crucified. He even felt temptation.

In the desert satan tempted Him: If you are God's Son jump from this temple, turn these stones into bread. Why don't you worship me?

And of course, satan tempts us too; does he not?

Are there not times when, like a bright light in our head, we ask: Is this all real? Is there really a God out there? Jesus? Life after death? And so on? And our mind gets all confused about what we really believe?

That's satan at work; ready to put these and other thoughts in our minds to lead us astray. The closer we come to God the harder the devil works to lead us away from Him. No point in tempting the un-believers is there?

And that's why Christ had to be tempted by satan. In order to share our experiences, but, most important, to be an example to us all on how to fight back these temptations. Through prayer.

Every time He was tempted He prayed to His Father. He was tempted again before He was arrested. He asked: Can all this pass me by? Then, in prayer, He obeyed His Father and said: Not my will, but Yours. What an example for us all to emulate. Not my will, but Yours.

FACING TOMORROW

Ah ... the future. How does it look to you?

Does it seem frightening sometimes when you look ahead at what could be and what could happen to you and yours? Financial difficulties may lie ahead perhaps; or failing health, or the many other possibilities that we see around us and we fear they may happen to us. There are so many dangers and pitfalls in our very existence these days. It's as if the odds are all stacked against us and we're all alone.

But we're not are we? Alone I mean.

There beside us, every step of the way, no matter what lies ahead, is Jesus ready to take away our fears and to guide us throughout this life and beyond. Only if we let Him.

I don't mean this in a figurative way; but quite literally. Yes, quite literally. He has promised to be with us always right here and right now. And to provide us with whatever help, comfort, encouragement and protection we need as we travel through our journey on this earth towards His Father in Heaven.

How does the future look now? Isn't it exciting, joyful, hopeful and uplifting to have the Son of God by your side as your guide for eternity? And I repeat ... quite literally.

"When I go, you will not be left all alone; I will come back to you." John 14:18.

CHOICES

THE HOLY SPIRIT

There's some logic which sometimes escapes us Christians.

We say we believe in God. We also believe in Jesus His only Son. And ... hesitantly perhaps ... we also believe in the Holy Spirit.

I say hesitantly because most people believe even though they might not know what to believe. And that's not always their fault.

Why is the church sometimes so reticent in proclaiming this – the greatest news and central message of our Christianity?

God, Christ, is/are with us right now. Through the Holy Spirit.



SEEKING MARY'S HELP

Not much is known about Jesus' childhood. The Bible records the story of His birth in Bethlehem and the early days of His life but not much more.

We are left to wonder what He was like as a baby. Crawling on the ground and then taking His first hesitant steps. I wonder what His first words were when He spoke.

One thing for sure though. He was much loved by His earthly parents, who devoted themselves to His up-bringing, until He was ready to start His work on earth as His Father willed. Like most parents, they must have wished many good things for Him as He grew up, even though they knew who He really was and what His mission in this world was to be.

Mary, however, carried an additional burden in her heart. She knew from those early days what was to happen. Simeon in the temple had told her: "... sorrow, like a sharp sword, will break your own heart". Luke 2: 35. Joseph was there to witness it all.

Can you imagine what they went through as parents? Knowing of the torture and Crucifixion which Christ would suffer.

And Mary, endured that pain even more as she followed her Son on the way to Calvary.

Yet ... despite all that. Despite knowing well ahead what was to happen, despite witnessing the Crucifixion for herself, one thing must have sustained Mary and encouraged her throughout her ordeal: the sure knowledge that Jesus was/is the Son of God and that He will rise again from the dead.

That thought alone should help us when we too go through difficult times. No matter how difficult our situation we should hold on to the fact that our Lord, the one we profess to love and follow, is the Son of God. By His death and Resurrection He has conquered evil once and for all.

And no matter what our situation may be, we can assuredly turn to Mary, and seek her help in bearing the difficulties we go through.

BASIC INSTINCTS

We all act on instinct from time to time. If we touch something hot or sharp we immediately withdraw in pain. If we taste something unpleasant, the basic instinct is to spit it out. I suppose the same applies when some terrible situation happens to us. The first instinct is probably fear, followed with a multitude of others such as confusion, doubts, worry, anger and so on.

But what if our first instinct in such situations was to immediately turn to God? Instinctively, without thinking, turn to God for help, reassurance, guidance and peace. What if our automatic reflex to any bad situation was an immediate reaching out to God? Before even the negative emotions come into play.

Wouldn't that make our lives that much better? Because after all, God's will for us is to have peace. Christ often greeted His disciples with the words "Peace be with you". So at the first sign of trouble, let's turn to Him and ask: "Lord, grant me your peace in this situation."

God gave us instincts and emotions as part of our human nature. Without instincts, we wouldn't pull away from a situation of danger or increased risk. It is natural therefore, when faced with a sudden crisis if our first instincts or emotions are fear, panic, worry, and similar negative responses to an unexpected traumatic event.

God knows that it's our nature reacting ... naturally. So He forgives our first negative impulses and knee-jerk reactions. But when we've calmed down a little, and taken a deep breath, that's when we should turn to our Lord and, instinctively, seek His help. Not in a panic sort of way, but in the sure knowledge that He is there beside us, in full control of the situation, (even if we aren't), and ready to help us and restore peace in our lives. If we let Him. If on the other hand we dwell on our negative situation, and nurture and harbor our fears and doubts, we do God a great disservice. Because we're implying that we don't really trust Him to solve our situation for us. And that surely is a sin.

"Every test that you have experienced is the kind that normally comes to people. But God keeps His promise, and He will not allow you to be tested beyond your power to remain firm; at the time you are put to the test, He will give you the strength to endure it, and so provide you with a way out". 1 Corinthians 10:13.

OUR CHOICE

Jesus was discussing with the crowd and said to them "I am the Bread of Life". "Unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink His blood ... you will not have eternal Life". John 6:25-59.

However, many of the followers of Jesus did not understand what He was saying and grumbled amongst themselves. Many decided to leave Him and follow Him no more. John 6:60-70.

So Jesus gave them a choice. A get out clause in the understood contract they had with each other. He did not follow them or begged them to stay. He did not try to explain what He said, or meant to say, in order to make them change their minds. He just allowed them to go.

Then He turned to His twelve disciples and asked: "And you – would you also like to leave?"

So the choice here seems somewhat clear. We either accept that Jesus is the Way to God. Or we don't.

PATIENCE

Nothing teaches us patience like waiting.

Remember when you were young and lacked patience? In those days a week was like a year. Especially if you'd been promised something by your parents and you had to wait and wait ...

I suspect the same applies to us when we relate to God. We pray for something and wait ... but God does not work to our timescales. He has His own plans and maybe what we're asking for is not good for us ... just yet.

WEALTH

Doesn't it sometimes irk you when someone asks for advice and then just ignores it? Jesus had a similar problem one day. He was approached by a rich man who asked Him "what must I do to receive eternal life?"

Jesus advised him to sell all he has and to give the money to the poor; and then to come and follow Jesus. Luke 18:18-30.

On hearing this, the man went away very sad; he was not willing to follow the advice given.

Let's pause here for a minute and reflect. What would you have done?

Let's assume God spoke to you right now, in a dream, or a vision, and you were certain it was Him speaking. Just as certain as Abraham, Moses, Noah, Mary and Joseph were when God spoke to them. You know where I'm getting to ... And God asked you to sell everything and give it to the poor, and become a missionary or a volunteer helper somewhere far off your community.

Would you be able to do it? Would you leave your spouse and family behind and follow Jesus wherever He asks you to go? Would you sell off everything you have, give up your job, leaving your children with nothing; and moved on to a new life? On reflection, perhaps we sympathize a little with the rich man. For we know not whether he had a family, friends and servants who relied on him – although we can assume he had.

Jesus then went on to say: "I repeat: it is much harder for a rich person to enter the Kingdom of God than a camel to go through the eye of a needle." Matthew 19:24.

So what is His message here? Is Jesus condemning wealth? Is it wrong to work hard and amass a fortune? Of course not.

Jesus, knowing the rich man's heart, is teaching us wealth with responsibility. He is saying that those fortunate enough to have wealth have a duty to consider those around them who are less well off than themselves, and to help them as best they can. Jesus makes this point most dramatically in the story about the rich man and Lazarus. It is worth reading in Luke 16:19.

FAILURE

Failure is sometimes necessary if we happen to learn from it. It is only a picture in time when you happen to click your camera and record it for posterity.

When someone fails an exam or a driving test, at that point in time we see failure. But if we move our slide show forward a few more frames that person may well have learnt their lesson and gone on to much greater success.

When Christ hung dying on the cross His followers saw failure. Here is a man whom many followed and listened to - as many as five thousand at one stage when He fed them loaves and fishes. They witnessed His many miracles and expected great things from Him. A new ruler, a new King, someone to bring them freedom from their Roman oppressors. Yet here He is, beaten, tortured, humiliated and dying on a cross amongst thieves.

Failure indeed.

Yet, a few frames forward and we see the Resurrection, the Ascension into Heaven, the sending of the Holy Spirit, a new church born and growing from strength to strength several centuries later.

Everlasting success.

Someone said to me once: I can't understand you Christians reveling in a man dying on a Cross.

He didn't understand that we are not "reveling" in His death; but that this was an essential step in Christ's life and mission on earth leading towards our salvation and forgiveness.

It is perhaps unfortunate that over the years the Cross has become a symbol of Christianity throughout the world. Perhaps a more fitting image would have been an empty tomb or a risen Christ. But we can't rewrite history – the Cross it is.

It may have been failure at that moment in time; but no more.

Let us remember this next time a camera clicks to record our personal failures; and let us take courage in the knowledge that, with His help, we can turn our negative moments into positives for others to emulate.



THE RIGHT WAVELENGTH

I was playing around with an old radio the other day trying to make it work. I'm not particularly good at electronic or electric stuff but that has never stopped me. I plugged the thing in and a small light shone at the front ... ah ... it's alive after all.

Turned the volume knob to the right until it stopped ... nothing.

Pulled out the telescopic aerial from the back and waved it in the air left and right, and in no particular direction. Still nothing happened.

And now the difficult technical bit ... I turned the other knob slowly; you know the one ... it moves a vertical bit of plastic left and right across the small screen.

Success at last ... now I could hear crackle and high pitched whistling every now and then as the plastic bit traveled slowly to the right. You can't quite dance to it but the crackle and whistling were there all right ... very clear too.

Every so often you could hear some faint music or someone talking, sometimes in a foreign language, interspersed with crackle and different music or speech.

Then I noticed something else. Every so often the same bit of speech repeated itself as the plastic bit moved on and picked different stations. Sometimes it was very faint and crackly, sometimes a little clearer and once or twice ... surprise, as loud and as clear as a bell.

A bit like God's voice I suppose.

He is there speaking to us. But sometimes the message is overpowered and stifled by the other noises and temptations that the world throws our way. Sometimes the crackle and hiss of doubts, fears and confusion are louder than the message itself. At times you must really sharpen your ears to even hear what's being said.

Yet ... every now and then ... you can hear Him clearly and you can understand His every Word and His message delivered sharply as if meant for you, and you alone.

All you have to do is be tuned to the right wavelength.
